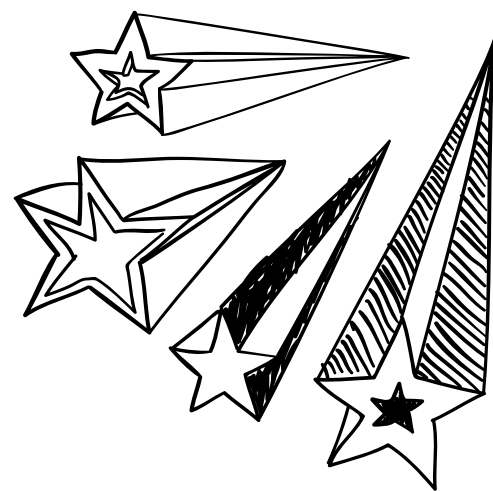


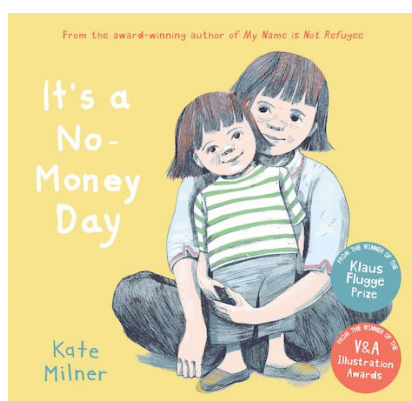
# ST BASILS STORYTIME

## DESCRIPTION

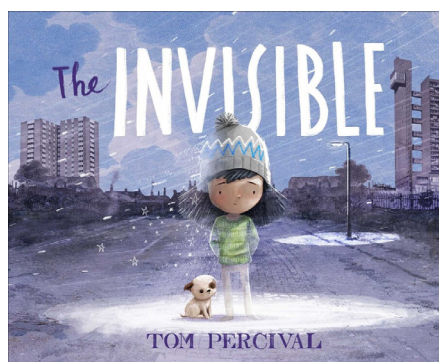
*Suitable for Pre-school readers (ages 3-5 years)*

## DESCRIPTION

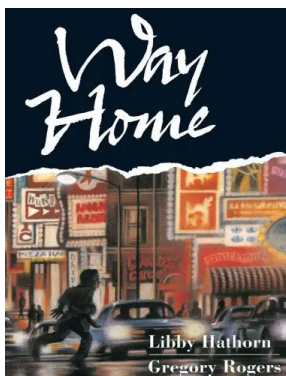
*Suitable for KS1 (ages 4-8 years)*

The Invisible is the story of a young girl called Isabel and her family who are struggling to meet their bills and rent payments and have to leave their family home and move across the city.

It is the story of those who are overlooked in our society - who are made to feel invisible and sparks feelings of empathy and solidarity whilst highlighting the importance of community and the fact that we all belong.

## DESCRIPTION

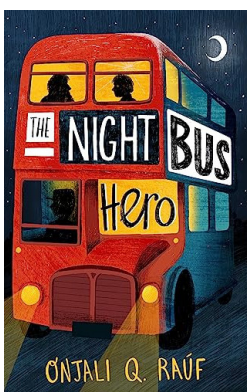
*Suitable for KS2 (ages 9-11 years)*

## DESCRIPTION

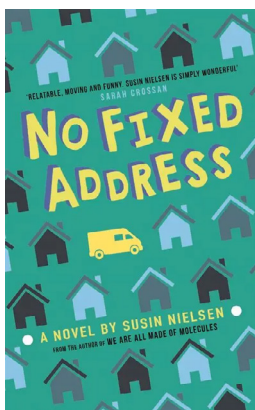
*Suitable for KS2 (ages 9-11 years)*

*Suitable for KS3 (ages 11-14 years)*

Felix and his mom Astrid have a secret: they are living in a van. Astrid promises it's only for a while until she finds a new job, and begs Felix not to breathe a word about it.

A moving story combining humour, heartbreak and hope about people who slip through the cracks in society and the pressure that young people feel to fit in. As homelessness becomes more common with families in our society, 'No fixed address' challenges preconceptions around homelessness and shares a message of hope through the power of friendship, kindness and community.
